

Chairmans Welcome and Report: Steve Daly

Tabled as read. Steve acknowledged how well the club has performed this year. He recognised the commitment of the staff and also of all the volunteers who give their time to the club.

President's Report: Rene Bovendeerd

Tabled as read. Rene thanked everyone for their continual support of the club. He thanked departing committee members for all the time and hard work they have committed to the good of the club.

Murray Seaward expressed sincere regret that he was unable to attend this evening. Rene acknowledged again all the volunteers that offer their support to the club. Matt and Simona continue to work extremely hard. Rene particularly acknowledged the increase in workload after JD resigned.

We have experienced much success on the field whilst at the same time developing our coaches.

We continue to work alongside the council to improve our playing facilities. Rene encouraged our members to contact the council regarding the poor state of our fields. There are plans across the city for a number of all-weather turfs.

Jodi Gauci indicated to the meeting that this will be coming up for community consultation very soon. The amount of community support that we receive will be significant in making this a success for our club.



President's Report - Rene Bovendeerd

Kia ora Koutou

Welcome everyone, and welcome to the life members to this year's AGM.

Firstly I would like to acknowledge the passing of our long standing club patron Jim Waddell, Jim has a long connection with the club and has always been an avid supporter of the men's first team. Thank you to him for all his hard work and dedication to the club.

Next I would like to acknowledge our outgoing treasurer Muz Moeller. Muz's energy and enthusiasm was infectious, he was the right person at the right time for this club. He took the reins at a time where financially the club was not in a good space, over his term he managed to reign in the unnecessary expenditures and bring the club back to a financial sustainable level. Personally he was really good to work with, many phone call about how to resolve our challenges, set the path for successful seasons and how to keep this beast of a club surging forward. Without him, his energy, direct nature and drive to resolve the issues, this club would be in a far different place. Thank you my friend, we will catch up for a drink later.

Thank you all for coming along tonight and for your continual support of the club. I especially want to acknowledge and say a massive thank you to those who volunteer their time to help this operate and provide football for all members of our community. This includes everyone from committee members, coaches, managers, game day leads and parents who just want to help out. If it were not for all these people we would not have a club. I simply cannot express how grateful I am to this awesome group of volunteers we have that dedicate endless hours to help the club deliver for the community. Yes we can achieve much more and we now need to find way to better connect with our community to enable us to engage and find those people with similar values who can help the club do so much more.

Our staff, Simona, Matt and Atticus have performed very well during the 2024 season. We are lucky to have such high calibre people on our team. They dedicate a lot of time to this club, They are at the forefront of our challenges and produce a lot of work to ensure the club is operating well to provide all our services to the community. With a vacant FDO position at the end of 2023, we brought on-board Atticus. Atticus has proved to be a high quality individual who has made a real impact to the club in such a short time. It is great to see how he has connected with our players and parents on the fields over the course of the year and helped improve the level of the experience of club members. Matt managed to successfully achieve the goal of having C licence coaches for all our academy teams. This enabled Matt to be more supportive across all teams instead of being consumed in coaching an academy team and allowing a deeper engagement in the Men's 1st team. Simona has taken on the GM role at the club at the start of 2024, It was important to manage the transition between staff members, this has gone really well and Simona has proved to be well suited to this role and performed very well. These people serve our club very well and I am grateful to have them part of our team and community.

2024 was a year to prove we got it right as a club, to show we are able to be and manage a sustainable football club with a full Junior, youth, TDP space, seniors as well as a CPL and SL team. I am proud to say that due to the efforts of all involved we have been able to achieve this. Knowing we have managed to get the club to a point where anyone can step into any role at any time and it will be able to maintain it's performance and place in the Mainland Football landscape makes me very proud and appreciative of all those who have helped get us to this point. After the failure of the FC Nomads joint venture, its safe to say we are mad to want to work with another club in the women's game. Although much hype has been driven around the women's game due to NZ co-hosting the World Cup. It has still proved a challenge to get momentum in this space. To me its logic that with a very small percentage of girls and women playing Football in Christchurch, to continue to compete with local clubs for players will not do any good for the development of the game. We entered into another understanding in the women's game this time with Waimakariri United. To date this has proved to be a far more successful collaboration due to the lack of ego

from both clubs and common goal to improve women's football, and so far, this collaboration is going stronger in 2025. I do want to acknowledge the efforts of Mike, Deb, Chris and the coaching staff at Waimak as they have done a great job for both clubs in this space.

Throughout 2024 we continued our battle for improvement to our fields and facilities. I can appreciate when we talk about how much we are petitioning the council and Mainland Football for improvements it may just appear as words. Which is why as a club we are proud to show and highlight the improvements we have been successful with. Many have noticed during the 'off season' \$1 had a long awaited overhaul with the complete resurfacing of this pitch. During this time drainage issues around the clubrooms were also addressed with the installation of artificial turf along the front of the clubrooms and improved drainage in front of the containers. We were also successful with funding for the upgrade of the toilets in the clubrooms. Its awesome to see such good improvements around the club. A massive thanks and well done to all those involved.

One of the challenges with the increased residential buildings being built around Tulett Park is balls going over fences. We are fortunate enough that during the season the neighbours tolerated this whilst we worked to find a solution. During the interim we would move goals that backed on to fences between game days. During the year we received a complaint about the noise coming from the park from a new resident into the area. This proved a challenge for the coaches and staff whom had to deal with the resident approaching them during training sessions to complain about the noise. Credit to the coaches and staff around how they handled themselves with these interactions. Myself and a member from the council parks team did meet with the resident to discuss concerns. Unfortunately we cannot control the noise of balls being kicked or the general communication from coaches and players during the games. Please understand the noise is not profanities. We do our best to manage the quality of Tulett Park and spread training sessions as best we can throughout the park. As much as we try, I cannot guarantee there won't be further complaints in 2025.

The proposed parks improvement in the Long Term Plan from the council has been approved to the value of \$53 million dollars. As we understand this money is to go into the establishment of up to 6 x 2 field all weather turns throughout Christchurch. The first will be at Nga Puna Wai, potentially followed by a location out east. In the North West, they council are looking for a suitable area for the installation of this field, note that existing green spaces will not be used. How long it will take to find a suitable space will depend on the consent process required. Cross fingers a location in the actual North West is found.

2024 also saw the last year of our contract with Inter Football. We took the opportunity to review other apparel suppliers. The offerings of many were all very similar. We really had to look at what is best for the club as a whole. At the end of the year we chose to sign with Dynasty Sport. They are becoming increasingly popular with sport clubs through NZ and Australia. We felt that their offering best suited what we are after as a club. A notable point is, in our constitution it is stated our colour as royal blue. It was quite surprising how far this has shifted with our previous offering. We were limited with our options for shirts and often had to go with close colours. Now, with Dynasty we will have a consistent royal blue colour for our club apparel. This shift has also enabled us to have Nomads branded apparel on the common items such as shorts and socks for all grades for very reasonable prices.

During 2024 we started looking into car parking around Tulett Park and improving the lighting of the park itself. These are the next big projects for the club and I want to acknowledge and thank Les Hill for his energy and willingness to push these issues and raise concerns with the local council. It has brought about discussions with the council and local councillors. The biggest challenge we have with the car parking is the council is actively trying to reduce the amount of vehicles on the roads. But installing another or further carparks does not support their objectives, instead it is pushed back to organisation's to develop other ways of physically bringing the community together. For the lighting of Tulett Park, this has the potential of being a multi-year project. We have received some good information of what other clubs have done to receive lighting upgrades and we will be using these as a basis to create our own plan for Tulett Park.

Overall it was another great season at Nomads, we had again over 1000 members. Which shows great consistency and a product that is well received by our community. Saturday mornings are the best down at Tulett Park with so many people being able to enjoy the sport of football. Having mums and dad's coach theirs and other people's kids at first kick, fun football, junior and youth teams is awesome to see. They joy they get from being out there having fun with their mates is so good. Coaching is literally one of the few things that you actually get out exactly what you put in. And how well Nomads performs as a club is due to the efforts of our coaches and game day leads at Nomads.

The 2024 season has been another fantastic chapter in the continued success of Nomads United AFC. I would like to extend my thanks and gratitude to all the volunteers who make our club a thriving community. Achievements and Highlights

Nomads United continues to set the benchmark in junior and youth football development. Our Pre-Academy and Academy programmes have maintained their focus on fostering both competitive performance and long-term player development. It is gratifying to see the fruits of our labour reflected in the growing success of our older youth teams, many of whom have progressed through our developmental pathway.

Key Achievements in 2024:

- · <u>Accredited Talent Development Programmes</u>: Our talent development initiatives, including Nomads PLUS+, the Pre-Academy, and the Academy, continued to thrive. These programmes were accredited as part of our successful 2024 club licensing application, further cementing Nomads United's reputation as one of the premier youth development clubs in the South Island.
- · <u>Wellington Phoenix Collaboration:</u> We strengthened our partnership with the Wellington Phoenix Football Academy, which culminated in their leadership of the first-ever South Island-based Discovery Camp hosted at Tulett Park.
- · <u>Senior Men's Team Success:</u> Our Senior Men's team qualified for the Southern League, competing at a high level throughout the season. The team secured key results, ensuring their place in the league for the 2025 season and providing players with an opportunity to perform at the highest tier of local football.
- · <u>Senior Women's Team Success:</u> The club fostered a relationship with Waimak United to form 'NW United' for the Women's Premier teams, enabling a pathway for our junior girls into a competitive senior women's space competing in the Women's South Island League and Mainland Women's Premier League.
- · Increased Tournament Participation: We continued to increase our involvement in national and regional tournaments, sending a larger number of teams to compete in prestigious events such as the CIC Cup (U10-U15), South Island tournaments (U9-U17), tours to Auckland and Wellington for our U14 and U15 teams respectively, and the Western Springs (U17) tournament.
- · <u>Summer Football Programme Growth</u>: Our Term Four Summer Football programme saw a significant increase in demand. We expanded capacity from 8 teams to 12 teams per age group to accommodate the growing popularity of the programme, which continues to be a highlight of our off-season activities. This has led to an expansion into term one summer football programmes which have proven popular. We also saw significant growth in our term four 'Future Ballers' programmes, continuing to provide opportunities for players all-year round to continue to develop & fall in love with the game.
- <u>Player Achievements:</u> Many of our players achieved individual recognition, Amber De Wit and Dorothy Yek joining the Wellington Phoenix Academy on a permanent basis a key highlight. Numerous players also earned Canterbury representative honours, reinforcing the strength of our development pathway.

Looking Ahead: A Call for Improved Facilities

As we look to the future, it is clear that the next critical step for Nomads United's continued growth and success is the enhancement of our training facilities. The lack of sufficient flood-lit training fields is a significant barrier that currently limits our ability to cater to the growing number of teams and players. Additionally, the need for improved training and playing surfaces, including the potential addition of artificial turf fields, is becoming increasingly urgent. Without these vital improvements, the club will face challenges in maintaining its current trajectory and expanding its offerings.

To continue our upward trajectory and provide our players and coaches with the best possible environment to excel, these infrastructure improvements must become a priority.

Nomads United's 2024 season has been one of continued growth, achievement, and community support. We remain committed to our mission of fostering talent, providing competitive opportunities, and serving as a cornerstone of football development in the region. Also thanks to Gary Tedder and helpers for managing the weekly programme delivery at Tulett Park.

The club has witnessed a growing number of youth players stepping into leadership roles through the First Kicks and Fun Football program and coaching within the junior space. Several youth members have taken on officiating roles as referees in competitions and summer programs, while others have contributed as assistant coaches in holiday programs. However, attracting new volunteers remains a challenge, and we must continue to focus on expanding participation through strategic initiatives.

2024 was another successful yet transitional year for Nomads. Key Achievements in 2024:

Coaching In Schools & Wristband Promotion: In early 2024 I went round to a plethora of local schools to provide an informal football experience for young players who previously hadn't had that opportunity, this programme was also tied in with Nomads wristbands that were given out to 150+ kids as a new age way of promotion that hit the ground running that has lead to young players still coming up to the office to get a wristband. This shows the innovative way Nomads can connect with the local area.

CPL Season: 2024 saw me lead the CPL team who compete in the Canterbury Premier league, my staff were undoubtably a huge reason for success, Jason Gwynne, Luke Ziswiler and Jamie Harris made my life so much easier and allowed me to focus on the more specific parts about the role. The season as a whole was successful in development, having players make their first team debut and having player develop

over the course of the season, pertaining to results it was up and down and although the end of season table didn't reflect the impact the team had on the pitch and now dominate they were in games the large portion of the team where either in their first or second year of senior football is commendable and has set them up for even more success this year.

Nomads U19s: The Nomads United U19s capped off a fantastic end of season league by winning it undefeated, showcasing their dominance and consistency throughout the campaign. 




















